



The 2016 US Pony Jumper National Championships, held as part of the US Pony Finals featured several Welsh competitors. Top honors went to Wishlea Star Dasher, an 11-year-old Half Welsh gelding (by Glencoe Nimbus) bred and owned by Brigid McMurtrie. Wishlea Star Dasher, ridden by Bailey Doloff, earned an Individiual Gold medal and was awarded the High Score Welsh Pony Award presented by Ruth Wilburn. Maya Lovdal and her Section C gelding Miracles Happen, registered as Miracle The Captain(*Mynydd Hir Orion x Heritage Hall's the Cat's Meow), received the Bronze medal.

Hi, I'm Emma Polus and I live in McKinney Texas where I'm a freshman at Collin College. Being born and raised in Texas, I always dreamed of having my own pony. When I was eight, I met my first Welsh pony through my friend, Jaci Baxter from Willow Hill Welsh Ponies. Since then I've been hooked! I started showing Welsh ponies in-hand and learned how to care for them. I just loved it. In 2011 I got my very own Welsh Pony from Janice Early, Lazy J Bailef's Alibi: "Ali". I rode and showed Ali for many years in English and Western as well as American Trail Challenges. It was a sad day when I outgrew her. In 2013 I purchased a large Half-Welsh, Half-Quarter horse, Lazy J's Extreme Justice: "Xbox."

Xbox was young and untrained, it gave me the opportunity to work and train a new horse from the ground up. Xbox and I have been very successful because of the help of so many people. I never could have done it without the mentoring of the Welsh people. The best part is they continue to teach me the right ways to train and show ponies. I'm really glad and lucky I got into the "Welsh world" because everyone is so helpful. I absolutely love showing ponies for other people

In FFA I had the highest score in horse judging and was also recognized for my work helping others on the team. Besides my work with ponies and FFA, I also have a black belt in the Korean martial art of Tae Kwon Do and have competed several times at the Nation Championship and Olympic trials where I have medaled twice in sparring. 

Whiperwil Farm, Willard, Wisconsin

In west central Wisconsin there is a small Welsh breeder who is working to raise excellent Welsh ponies, known for their loving personality, family friendly nature and correct conformation. Whiperwil Farm is owned by Jim, Reita, and Tasha Gelander in Willard, WI.

Their first Welsh was purchased in 1999, the Sec A mare Asgard Bronze Sand, [Meadowlawn Squire x Asgard

Golden Sand]. Later that fall they leased from Maureen Lapicola, Asgard Farm, the weanling B filly, Asgard Silver Harp, [Gayfields Vida Blue x Asgard Arian Telyn], aka Rosie, which they bought a few years later. She started her show career as a yearling to learn what shows were all about. When she reached the age of five, she started earning the halter awards. She was Supreme and Reserve Supreme at many shows often earning these awards

under both judges. From 2003 to 2008 she was the North Central champion or reserve champion mare. Rose was retired from showing at that time after a she suffered a round of founder. In 2015, we were blessed with her first daughter after three colts. Whiperwil Reign of Silver, aka Rainy, is sired by Clanfair the Monarch. Rainy started to learn the show life this summer. She has some big hoof prints to fill and only time will tell how she will do. The next Sec B mare to join the farm was Hillcrest's Miss Abigail, [Gayfields Vida Blue x Hillcrest's American Beauty], owned by Ed and Marilyn Checki. Another mare was not in the planning, but how do you turn down such a well-breed mare when it is offered to you. Thank you Marilyn Checki for trusting us with Abby. She was never shown due to a mis-formed hoof. If not for this, we would never have seen her as she would have been making her mark in the hunter world.

The next mare to join the farm was Rollingwoods Unforgettable, aka Getty, [Sleight of Hand, LOM, AOE, OD x Varndell Desiree]. She was lightly shown under saddle before coming to us. She was shown at one show with us and was named Supreme champion that day. During this time we tried to breed Asgard Silver Harp to Goldhills Most Wanted, but she would not settle by AI breeding.

So after talking to Megan Burtness, the breeding was used with Getty and she settled the first time. In the spring of 2013, we were blessed with a palomino roan colt, Whiperwil Most Dashing.

Our next B mare was Dandardel FFionsera, aka Sera, [Gayfields Ffigaro x Menai Seren Fwyn] owned by Kathi Lindholm. This was another case of a unplanned addition to the herd. Sera was maturing too tall for Kathi's driving equipment. We were "told" that we were going to buy Sera; thankfully, we are good friends with Kathi and she was willing to work with us. In 2015 Sera was bred to Clanfair the Monarch, and presented us with a very nice filly in 2016. These two half sisters are special as Monarch is known for producing colts. He has only around seven or eight fillies to date, and I am lucky to have two of them. The next B mare to arrive was Trevethan Royal Signature, aka Dolly, [Flare's Royal Signature x Misty Mountain Abigail]. This mare was found on craigslist. You

never know where you can find a great Welsh pony. Dolly is trained to drive and is my show pony. The last two years Dolly has started winning in the halter classes and has been named Supreme and Reserve Supreme at a few of the shows. We have even be able to place on the national level for Pleasure driving 12.2 and over a time or two, and also on the national for Draft driving single. It is

> looking like we will also place on the national level again this year.

> This year my colt, Whiperwil Most Dashing, is three yeas old and covered his first mares. The first one due is out of a reg Quarter Pony. The other two mares bred did not stay. Then there was the day in July when my husband got sidetracked by the Tour De France bike race, and did not get out to check a gate that was looking off balance. When I got home a number of hours later, I was informed that when he did get out there, the gate was

down. The stud was on the edge of the herd, being kept away by the boss mare. However, our Sec A mare, Whiperwil Bronze Pixie, was in full heat that day. Husband said "she was in the barn with the gelding" when he went out. Well you all know what that means. When we had the vet out a few months later to check the mares, guess who is bred? As this was not a planned cross, watch this be an outstanding foal. God knows best and we are just along for the ride. Whiperwil Farm also raises Sec A ponies with outstanding bloodlines. And thanks to our friendship with Susan Stepney, we are dipping our toes into the Sec C's with the lease of two of her mares. A farm website is in the works, so please check it out in the future. It will be www. whiperwilwelsh.com. Excellent Welsh ponies can be found in the Midwest too, not just on the east or west coasts. Please check them out and find your new best friend.



Both of these ponies were sired by RosMel's Notorious, who now resides at Blue Ridge Welsh as their senior stallion. And today, one of their best broodmares is a sister to RosMel's Jack Frost through his Supreme Champion dam, RosMel's Daystar.

When asked what other bloodlines and specific individuals had been the basis for their breeding program, Harmony stated: "The pedigrees in our herd are mostly based on a mix starting with primarily RosMel bloodlines as I feel they have exceptional temperaments in general along with consistent quality conformation and movement, then crossed with proven producing lines such as Findeln Blue Danube, his sons Cloe Olympian and Gayfield's Vida Blue, Bristol Sun Sylph, and *Sleight of Hand LOM/AOE/OD. This has proven to be a successful combination for us."

Throughout their many years of breeding quality Welsh ponies, the primary goal has always been to produce a sane, tractable, and balanced pony with halter quality conformation, exceptional movement, and plenty of breed type. Harmony said: "I love great hindquarters and shoulder along with a great neck. With a well conformed pony, the movement will be there. I also want a pony that is suitable for a family to raise and enjoy as well as one that is highly competitive for the show ring."

While having had a number of wonderful Section A's over the years, that were truly great ponies, it was the size of the Section B's and their potential for success in just about any discipline with both adults and juniors, that has led to Blue Ridge Welsh focusing on Section B's over other ponies. The focus of the Blue Ridge program over the years has been to produce ponies that can go any direction in the show ring, true all-around ponies. While a number of their ponies have been sold to the hunter ring, the Downmans do not breed specifically for this market, and as a result these same ponies are easily competitive and successful in the breed ring. Harmony believes that a pony needs to be correct as a Welsh first, have a great disposition, and success

will follow. Typically they try to market their ponies as weanlings to three year olds, which allows their new owners to bring them along as they choose.

Harmony was emphatic when she said: "One thing that I particularly love about the Section B Welsh is that they really can do anything! Not only are they beautiful to watch, they have proven that they can be successful in a wide variety of disciplines whether with an adult or a junior. I also love that they are so hardy and have excellent feet! I have found that typically they do not require anything "extra" to keep them sound, healthy, and happy which is an issue I see often in so many other breeds. I also really love that they have something to offer everyone, from the beginning child to the seasoned adult."

All of these qualities and then some made RosMel's Scarlet Legacy (RosMel Cotillion LOM x RosMel's Scarlet Lace (by Ardmore Traveller LOM) Harmony's once in a lifetime pony. Now known as "Simply Untouchable," Legacy was bred by RosMel pony farm and Blue Ridge Welsh purchased him in utero after getting to know his wonderful brother, RosMel's Scarlet Emperor. Harmony states that she was there the day he was born and his big belly spot made quite the splash. He was a very easy foal and Legacy has been successful in everything asked, from a champion multidiscipline show pony to a sire of grand champions. His show ring wins include USEF Horse of the Year Adult Hunter Zone Champion, USDF All Breed Award Champion Welsh Pony, Training Level Dressage (his only year shown in dressage), numerous WPCSA Section B Halter and Performance year end awards, WPCSA Open Dressage Awards High Point score, and he was even successful in Eventing against horses. Harmony reported that when he was not showing, Legacy happily went on many trail rides throughout the beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains and was also quiet enough to be ridden and shown by a junior as a breeding stallion. Legacy is now owned and loved by a fantastic young rider and this year was his first in the rated pony hunters. He was champion at the Winter Equestrian Festival first time shown with his new owner, fresh from the pasture and newly gelded. He has since been circuit champion at Tryon, 6th for Welsh Awards at his first Pony Finals, and at last check he was 1st in the nation in the USEF Green Medium Pony Hunters. Legacy has clearly proven to Harmony and all of his many fans that the Section B can truly do anything! Harmony added, "He has always risen to the challenge ahead of him, and he will always have a special place in my heart."

In addition to their herd of Section B's Harmony's earlier background in hunters and also Arabians have led to good success crossing their Section B ponies to Quarter horses and Thoroughbreds. Many of their clients and friends have also crossed the Blue Ridge Section B's to Warmblood and Arabian mares for sport and hunter ponies which has proven quite successful for them. Harmony has been particularly

impressed with the Quarter horse x Welsh cross, in particular, for easy going and fancy children's ponies; and she adds that they have proven to be just as wonderful for adults!

to be just as wonderful for adults! All of us can usually think of a personal anecdote or story about Welsh ponies that really exemplifies

what makes the Welsh ponies and Welsh people so exceptional. Harmony is a bit more people focused than pony focused but does in a few words summarize the attraction that draws all of us to the breed and keeps us fans for life. Harmony said: "When I attended our first Welsh show I really had no idea what I was doing. My background was in the hunters and Arabians which are both quite different from the Welsh. I realized that I did not have a great show halter for RosMel's

Daydream, and while walking the aisles happened to strike up a conversation with WPCSA president Ruth Wilburn (Rollingwoods), who offered to loan one to me. I was beyond thrilled that she took the time to not only talk to me, but to help out an obvious newcomer. This was a big contrast to what I had known of the show world prior, and I was hooked from then on. Although the shows are competitive, they are conducted with good sportsmanship and camaraderie which I find is the perfect show environment for my family. "

Harmony and the entire Downman family especially enjoy working with the foals and watching them develop. Harmony said: "As I get older, I have begun to focus more on driving than riding, and our finished performance ponies have been more than happy to pursue this new discipline with me. Every day that I spend with the ponies is a gift,

> and I suppose most of all I enjoy the interactive moments we have together on a daily basis." When asked for advice on how new members can get started in Welsh ponies and in particular Section B's she replied: "There is so much to know about these wonderful ponies

and a great place to start is with the WPCSA. Learn the breed standard and rules. To get an idea of what you like in a pony, look at as many as you can, online and in person, and find out their ancestry. Go to the Welsh shows (They are FUN!), study the pedigrees, and ask LOTS of questions! Most folks are more than happy to talk ponies!"





Most people can think of a moment in their life when a decision changed the path of their life. For Jaime Picton, the decision to reply to answer a help wanted ad in a newspaper set her life on a course that she could not have imagined and a dream career, surrounded by the animals she loves on a beautiful farm in the Arkansas hills.

There is a lot more to Jaime than first meets the eye. She is a quiet but friendly person who has an enormous work ethic. Trained as a vet tech who worked at a Colorado vet clinic, Jaime came to Smoke Tree with the kind of experience and personality that was a perfect fit at just the right time for Kathy Reese who owned successful and respected Smoke Tree Welsh Pony Farm.

Smoke Tree farm is also home to the Arkansas Animal Rescue which is a nonprofit, no kill facility that currently has 42 dogs and 60ish cats in residence. Jaime explains, "we actually place very few of our animals, most of them are old and have medical problems. The ones that we do place are posted on our Facebook page. The animals here are in no danger of euthanasia if someone does not adopt them, so we actually prefer people to adopt from a kill shelter and truly save a life." The farm has five employees.

Jaime's equine experience was a lifetime of using Quarter Horses on the family farm, checking cattle, trail rides and rodeo. In 2009, Jaime began her career at Kathy Reese's Smoke Tree Farm starting with the dog/cat rescue side of the farm. Kathy soon realized that Jaime knew her way around horses and Jaime started vaccinating the ponies and working with the broodmares. Soon she was handling a lot of the breeding and eventually, working with the foaling. Kathy taught Jaime what she looked for in a pony, how she worked her breeding and marketing programs and how to show a pony in hand.

When Kathy realized she was ill, she began teaching Jaime in what she called a crash course in Section B pedigrees. Jaime took the task very seriously and did not want to disappoint Kathy so she learned as much as she could from a teacher with a vast background in Section B Welsh Ponies. "It was an honor for me to have known her, she taught me so much. Kathy went beyond an employer for me, we shared a lot of laughs, we shared a lot of hard times. I was there when she got sick and I was there at the end and all of it in the middle. I had several years to spend with her and truly get to know her, something I hold dear to me. She was my Welsh Pony mentor, my friend and at times my 'partner in crime.' Kathy had a huge sense of humor and we were known to play some pranks on people!"

The farm is now owned by a trust left by Kathy Reese and run by a board of directors. Jaime is the Executive Director of Operations. She describes the position as "it just means I'm right here on the farm working and I pay the bills." It is obvious that Jaime was the right choice for the job as it is a chosen lifestyle for her. Her typical workday is "when your eyes open to when your eyes close, and you can still be on call." Her Smoke Tree mares enjoying the good life in the farm pastures. Eleven mares are expecting Section B foals.

five year plan is to have "another Smoke Tree bred stallion to stand, have more going on in the performance ring and still be breeding beautiful, correct ponies." The farm is expecting eleven Section B foals in 2017 and her husband Ozzy Picton is expecting three Section D foals from his breeding program.

Jaime describes their operation as a family affair. Ozzy loves all of the animals on the farm but was particularly interested in the Section D Welsh Cobs after attending shows. He now has a breeding program of his own and is showing his driving mare, Mynydd Hir Moorea and his very successful halter mare, *Blaengwen Charm. Their young son, Brysyn, enjoys all of the animals on the farm. Family, friends, and Ozzy's mom, Louise Picton, fill the Smoke Tree aisle up at shows and they are known for their great cooking (Ozzy's smoked pulled pork) and hospitality. They take a full size refrigerator to shows and sometimes set up a double stall kitchen. Ozzy is very interested in encouraging the youth and sponsors 'candy bags' at the American National as well as working with young riders in the summer on the farm.

When asked about the stallions standing at Smoke Tree, Jaime said "We currently stand six stallions, five Section B and one Section D. *Bunbury Jamboree is one of our foundation sires. Kathy imported him as a youngster. Smoke Tree Golden Sun is on lease from Denise Hinder. We are so thankful to Denise to have this opportunity. Bullsy is from our foundation stock and is a son of the late *Smoke Tree Spun Gold. He represents everything we want in a pony and years of Kathy's hard work. *Downland Condor was chosen because of the intelligent and correct foals he produces. He gives them brains, good size and to me you can't go wrong with those Downland lines (some of my favorite). *Cadanvalley Advocaat. When I look at a stallion the first thing I want to see is a brain and a gentle nature. This boy has that and so much more. We have a few foals on the ground by him and he has put intelligence, size and pony type to everyone of them.

"Caddo Twist N Shout! I fell in love with this boy when I saw him at the American National Show in 2013. Talk about pony type and brains galore! He puts temperament, trainability and type on all of his foals. *Nebo Calonog is on lease from Susan Stepney. We were honored to be allowed the chance to lease this amazing stallion. We wanted him so badly because he produces foals that are true to Cob type and man can the move!"


"We have several outstanding mares and all of them are my favorites in some way or another. Haley is one of our top young exhibitors from one of our families very much dedicated to WPCAC, SCAWS, OWPS, WPCSA and the Welsh breed, the Maurer's of Gaslight Farm. David and Carol Maurer, Haley's paternal grandparents, began Gaslight Farm as a family activity in Yorba Linda, California in 1983. David decided that he was most interested in Welsh Mountain Ponies, so their breeding program was established first with U.S. born ponies, and then with many ponies imported from the Ceulan Stud in Wales. Both David and Carol showed ponies in halter and driven classes. They later also decided to acquire section C, and have done several A x C breedings that have produced talented Welsh. As kids, Haley's father Benjamin (Ben) and aunt Darci rode extensively, and Darci continued to show ponies as an adult, while Ben moved out of state and got married

to Shannon, Haley's mother, with both of them still attending the Welsh shows occasionally. Haley regularly attends the Welsh shows with her grandparents and fully participates in them!

With David and Carol relocating from their urban farm in Orange County, California to a larger farm in Roseburg, Oregon in 2009, there was an opportunity for Haley and her family to move into the second home on the farm. Haley then had the chance to really be around the ponies and get to know them. She started riding at age two and showing the next year when she was three years old. 

Glannant Cadence ~ A Section B Sire for the Ages



Glannant Cadence (B-28137) was foaled April 29, 1981 on Mrs. Mollie Butler's Glannant Farm in Ithaca, New York. Glenda Armstrong, of Glynhafan Farm, had been raising mostly Section A's (and a few Section B's) at the time (with two of her Section A's being Glynhafan Bayberry and Dolhir Short Snorter), but had decided to concentrate on the Section B's. A friend who had seen Cadence at Mrs. Butler's farm also knew Glenda was looking for a stallion and suggested she go take a look at the young colt. As luck would have it, someone had already put a down payment on him but was unable to complete the purchase and instead, Cadence went home with Mrs. Armstrong to become the foundation sire of her Section B herd

Cadence was a very typey, large, grey Section B and quite versatile. Measuring at 14 hands, he rode English and Western, drove, jumped and showed in-hand. He was quite the gentleman, both on and off the farm. During his lifetime, he sired 54 foals, 12 of which were half-Welsh. He compiled many regional and national titles with both WPCSA and USEF over the years and received his WPCSA sire Legion of Merit in 2000.

Among the purebreds sired over the years by Cadence are Glynhafan Echo (owned and shown by Susie Eastman), Glynhafan Leda, Glynhafan Red Hawk LOM, and Tangwyllt Calypso (all shown by Glynhafan Farm) and Glynhafan Butch Cassidy. Most notable of the half-Welsh are Glynhafan Taewyn, who attained the WPCSA Award of Excellence rather recently and Glynhafan Legs Diamond (owned and shown by Amanda Boltz.)

Sleigh Bells Ring

hat could make a more charming mental image than a Welsh Pony or Cob put to a sleigh, in a wintry landscape, accompanied by the tinkling, jingling sound of sleigh bells. The following is an overview of sleigh bells; the history, types, and voice of these engaging accessories.

Sleigh Bell History

Bells have been used to adorn horses all over the world since at least 800 BC. Historians state that they were initially developed to attract good luck, protect against disease, scare away the devil, show off the owner's wealth, and in more recent years, with increasing population and traffic, to warn others of the approaching sleigh/carriage. They were also used to sound the arrival of street vendors and delivery wagons, much like the ice cream truck of contemporary times.

It was in the 1800s when bells began to be used increasingly for winter time recreation. Winter sleigh rides were quite popular among the equine owning set. These sleigh rides required fashionable and warm clothing, ornate sleighs, well-groomed horses, and beautifully polished harness with bells. The association of horse bells with Christmas and the winter season led people to begin calling them "sleigh bells" and the name has stuck through current times.

Bell manufacturing hit an all-time high in the USA in the early 1800s with some of the highest quality bells coming from the William Barton plant in East Hampton, Connecticut. By the 1950s only a small handful of manufacturers remained. However, it is still possible to find companies who craft beautiful bells in our country today.

Types of Bells

The first and most unexpected thing to discover about bells is that the traditional sleigh bell is technically a rattle, a pellet trapped within a hollow sphere. The official term is "crotal" for this rattle type of bell. Alternatively, a "bell" has an open end with a clapper. Think "Liberty Bell" to visualize the traditional bell shape. Most people will be more familiar with the crotal type of sleigh bell.

Crotals made for horse harness are seen in several shapes. Round shaped is the most common but they can also be square, or bevel, with round or flared edges. Some specialty bells come in acorn and flower shapes. In the popular holiday movie Polar Express, the first gift of Christmas was an acorn shaped crotal.

Crotals are most often attached to leather straps that can then be worn by the horse, either connected to the harness, separate from the harness, or attached to the sleigh/carriage itself. They can be all of one size or varying sizes to create chords and harmonic sounds. The bigger the crotal, the lower the tone it makes.

The throat of the crotal refers to the number of slits, which allow the bell to vibrate and make the ringing sound. In earlier years, crotals were designed with one large throat, giving them a rich tone. In the 1800s, manufacturers began adding two and even three throats, which gave the bells a softer chime or jingle sound. It is the multiple-throated crotals (sleigh bells) that we now associate with Christmas music and that is most familiar to our ears.

An additional type of crotal is known as the Swedish bell, which is a large bell of two or three inches in diameter. They have three distinctive slits that make the bell look like a sliced pie. The large sized Swedish bells have a characteristic deep melodic tone and are most often found on draft horse hitches.

Another feature of the crotal is the manufactuers' decorations and distinctive marks. Some manufacturers include their initials, numbers indicating size of bell, flower images, abstract designs, fish scale, and other artistic patterns on the surface of the crotal. It's not hard to imagine why bell collections have become popular in recent years as the types, designs, and images on the bells are wide ranging with often beautiful results.

The next most common type of sleigh bell is an actual bell and is used on the shaft or collar. They come in a traditional bell shape with one clapper. They are most often found attached to a leather strap, and the strap is then attached to the shaft or harness. Another version consists of the bells suspended from a metal frame which is screwed onto the shaft. Shaft bells are found in combinations of four or five bells with the bells being of varying sizes to create a chord sound.

A different sort of harness bell is the saddle chime. The saddle chime typically has three bells, each with two or more clappers. The additional clappers differentiate the chime from the standard bell. The three bells are supported and attached to a metal arch which itself is attached to the saddle turrets. Saddle in this case means the harness saddle, not a riding saddle. The saddle chime juts up from the harness just behind the withers. The chimes have a softer, more melodious sound than the larger harness crotals and are preferred by many sleigh enthusiasts seeking a calm, pleasant journey rather than a bold blast of sound.

Bells, crotals, and chimes can be forged or stamped; of brass, chrome, or nickel. The sounds they make are as unique as their appearance. Anyone purchasing sleigh bells should be sure to listen to the bells before purchase. Some people find the long harness straps with multiple crotals to be too harsh sounding, or too loud for quiet drives in the forest, or perhaps too stimulating for their equine partners. For these folks, the tinkling saddle chime or merry jingling of smaller shaft bells may be more to their liking.

Ways of attaching the bells:

There are as may ways to attach sleigh bells as there are types of bells. There isn't a right or wrong way as long as the set up works from both an esthetic and safety perspective. Some of the more common arrangements include:

Body straps: Long straps buckled around the middle of the horse/ pony

Neck straps: Straps buckled around the horse's collar or neck Rump straps: Big bells on short, wide straps that go over the horse's back

Saddle and shaft bells: Bells attached to the harness or vehicle Hame bells: Bells fastened on the horse's collar

Drops and swingers: Bells on very short straps or small metal brackets hung from any location

A word of caution:

Crotals, saddle chimes, and bells can create obstacles that trap the reins. A whip (driver) must consider this and practice rein handling starting with ground driving and long lining before using bells while driving in unconfined areas. This is practical advice for even an experienced whip.

Sleigh bell trivia:

The song Jingle Bells, also known as One Horse Open Sleigh, written by James Lord Pierpont, is one of the most popular and most recorded songs on Earth. It was originally meant as a Thanksgiving song.

Sleigh bells were one of the first instruments played in space. In 1965, Gemini 6 astronauts Tom Stafford and Wally Schirra, smuggled bells onto their spacecraft and played Jingle Bells for mission control as a holiday surprise.

The phrase "I'll be there with bells on." originated from the era when horse and carriage was the primary form of transportation in this country. Arriving with "bells on" showed enthusiam for arriving at the destination.


